rudolf hoss has been called the greatest mass murderer in history as the longest serving commandant of auschwitz he supervised the killing of more than 1 1 million people unlike many of his nazi colleagues who denied either knowing about or participating in the holocaust hoss remorselessly admitted both at the nuremberg war crimes trial and in his memoirs that he sent hundreds of thousands of jews to their deaths in the gas chambers frankly describing the killing process his innovations included the use of hydrogen cyanide derived from the pesticide zyklon b in the camp s gas chambers hoss lent his name to the 1944 operation that gassed 430 000 hungarian jews in 56 days exceeding the capacity of the auschwitz s crematoria this biography follows hoss throughout his life from his childhood through his nazi command and eventual reckoning at nuremberg using historical records and hoss autobiography it explores the life and mind of one of history s most notorious and sadistic individuals

sam pivnik is the ultimate survivor from a world that no longer exists on fourteen occasions he should have been killed but luck his physical strength and his determination not to die all played a part in sam pivnik living to tell his extraordinary life story in 1939 on his thirteenth birthday his life changed forever when the nazis invaded poland he survived the two ghettos set up in his home town of bedzin and six months on auschwitz s notorious rampkommando where prisoners were either taken away for entry to the camp or gassing after this harrowing experience he was sent to work at the brutal furstengrube mining camp he could have died on the death march that took him west as the third reich collapsed and he was one of only a

handful of people who swam to safety when the royal air force sank the prison ship *Arcona* in 1945 mistakenly believing it to be carrying fleeing members of the SS he eventually made his way to London where he found people too preoccupied with their own wartime experiences on the home front to be interested in what had happened to him now in his eighties Sam Pivnik tells for the first time the story of his life a true tale of survival against the most extraordinary odds

co winner of the Yad Vashem International Book Prize for Holocaust Research from January 1945 in the last months of the Third Reich about 250 000 inmates of concentration camps perished on death marches and in countless incidents of mass slaughter they were murdered with merciless brutality by their SS guards by army and police units and often by gangs of civilians as they passed through German and Austrian towns and villages even in the bloody annals of the Nazi regime this final death blow was unique in character and scope in this first comprehensive attempt to answer the questions raised by this final murderous rampage the author draws on the testimonies of victims perpetrators and bystanders hunting through archives throughout the world Daniel Blatman sets out to explain to the extent that is possible the effort invested by mankind's most lethal regime in liquidating the remnants of the enemies of the Aryan race before it abandoned the stage of history what were the characteristics of this last Nazi genocide how was it linked to the earlier stages the slaughter of millions in concentration camps how did the prevailing chaos help to create the conditions that made the final murderous rampage possible in its exploration of a topic nearly neglected in the current history of the Shoah this book offers unusual insight into the workings and the unraveling of the Nazi regime it combines micro historical accounts of representative massacres with an overall analysis of the collapse of the Third Reich helping us to understand a seemingly inexplicable chapter in history

examines Auschwitz a death camp during the Holocaust including its construction and daily workings true accounts from prisoners of the camp and Nazi perpetrators and how more than 1 million people were murdered there provided by publisher

by his own admission SS Kommandant Rudolf Höss was history's greatest mass murderer having personally supervised the extermination of approximately two million people mostly Jews at the death camp in Auschwitz Poland *Death Dealer* is the first complete translation of Höss's memoirs into English these bone chilling memoirs were written between October 1946 and April 1947 at the suggestion of Professor Stanislaw Batavia a psychologist and Professor Jan Shen the prosecuting attorney for the Polish War Crimes Commission in Warsaw Höss wrote a lengthy and detailed description of how the camp developed his impressions of the various personalities with whom he dealt and even the extermination of millions in the gas chambers this written testimony is perhaps the most important document attesting to the Holocaust because it is the only candid detailed and for the most part honest description of the final

solution from a high ranking ss officer intimately involved in carrying out the plans of hitler and himmler with the cold objectivity of a common hit man höss chronicles the discovery of the most effective poison gas and the technical obstacles that often thwarted his aim to kill as efficiently as possible staring at the horror without reacting höss allowed conditions at auschwitz to reduce human beings to walking skeletons then he labelled them as subhumans fit only to die readers will witness höss s shallow rationalizations as he tries to balance his deeds with his increasingly disturbed yet always ineffectual conscience

eva mozes kor was 10 years old when she arrived in auschwitz while her parents and two older sisters were taken to the gas chambers she and her twin miriam were herded into the care of the man known as the angel of death dr josef mengele and subjected to sadistic medical experiments and forced to fight daily for their own survival through this book readers will learn of a child s endurance and survival in the face of truly extraordinary evil the book also includes an epilogue on eva s recovery from this experience and her remarkable decision to publicly forgive the nazis through her museum and her lectures she has dedicated her life to giving testimony on the holocaust providing a message of hope for people who have suffered and working toward goals of forgiveness peace and the elimination of hatred and prejudice in the world

a sobering story of an industrial family s cold efficiency behind the design of the ovens at auschwitz architects of death tells the astonishing story of how the gas chambers and crematoria that facilitated the murder and incineration of more than one million people in the holocaust were designed not by the nazi ss but by a small respectable family firm of german engineers topf and sons designed and built the crematoria at the concentration camps at auschwitz birkenau buchenwald belzec dachau mauthausen and gusen at its height 66 topf triple muffle ovens were in operation 46 of which were at auschwitz these were not nazi sadists but men who were playboys and the sons of train conductors they were driven not by ideology but by love affairs personal ambition and bitter personal rivalries even while their firm created the ultimate human killing and disposal machines their company sheltered nazi enemies from the death camps the intense conflagration of their very ordinary motives created work that surpassed in inhumanity even the demands of the ss but the company that achieved this spectacularly evil feat of engineering typify the banality of evil in the 1930s their family firm produced apparatus for all sorts of industries baking brewing the firing of ceramics ovens for crematoria accounted for only a small proportion of their business but it is for these that the topf brothers became infamous their name can still be seen stamped on the iron furnaces of auschwitz

as the first transport from slovakia makes its way to auschwitz concentration camp in 1942 lale sokolov immediately stands out to the other prisoners for his composed appearance and outwardly assured manner in the camp he is looked up to looked out for and put to work in

the privileged position of tätowierer tattooist marking his fellow inmates with their identification numbers forever one of them is a young woman gita who steals his heart at first glance his life given new purpose lale does his best through the struggle and suffering to use his position for good this story full of beauty and hope is based on years of interviews author heather morris conducted with real life holocaust survivor and auschwitz birkenau tattooist ludwig lale sokolov it is heart wrenching illuminating and unforgettable morris climbs into the dark miasma of war and emerges with an extraordinary tale of the power of love leah kaminsky

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while in a russian administered holding camp in katowice poland in 1945 primo levi was asked to provide a report on living conditions in auschwitz published the following year it was subsequently forgotten and remained unknown to a wider public dating from the weeks and months immediately after the war auschwitz report details the authors harrowing deportation to auschwitz and how those who disembarked from the train were selected for work or extermination as well as being a searing narrative of everyday life in the camp and the organization and working of the gas chambers it constitutes levi s first lucid attempts to come to terms with the raw horror of events that would drive him to create some of the greatest works of twentieth century literature and testimony auschwitz report is a major literary and historical discovery

from the moment i got to auschwitz i was completely detached i disconnected my heart and intellect in an act of self defense despair and hopelessness with these words sara nomberg przytyk begins this painful and compelling account of her experiences while imprisoned for two years in the infamous death camp writing twenty years after her liberation she recreates the events of a dark past which in her own words would have driven her mad had she tried to

relieve it sooner but while she records unimaginable atrocities she also richly describes the human compassion that stubbornly survived despite the backdrop of camp depersonalization and imminent extermination commemorative in spirit and artistic in form *Auschwitz* convincingly portrays the paradoxes of human nature in extreme circumstances with consummate understatement *Nomberg Przytyk* describes the behavior of concentration camp inmates as she relentlessly and pitilessly examines her own motives and feelings in this world unmitigated cruelty coexisted with nobility rapacity with self sacrifice indifference with selfless compassion this book offers a chilling view of the human drama that existed in *Auschwitz* from her portraits of camp personalities an extraordinary and horrifying profile emerges of *Dr Josef Mengele* whose medical experiments resulted in the slaughter of nearly half a million Jews *Nomberg Przytyk*'s job as an attendant in *Mengele*'s hospital allowed her to observe this angel of death firsthand and to provide us with the most complete description to date of his monstrous activities the original Polish manuscript was discovered by *Eli Pfefferkorn* in 1980 in the *Yad Vashem* archive in Jerusalem not knowing the fate of the journal's author *Pfefferkorn* spent two years searching and finally located *Nomberg Przytyk* in Canada subsequent interviews revealed the history of the manuscript the author's background and brought the journal into perspective

first published in polish in 1982 by the auschwitz birkenau state museum

a powerful chronicle of the women who used their sewing skills to survive the holocaust stitching beautiful clothes at an extraordinary fashion workshop created within one of the most notorious wwii death camps at the height of the holocaust twenty five young inmates of the infamous auschwitz birkenau concentration camp mainly jewish women and girls were selected to design cut and sew beautiful fashions for elite nazi women in a dedicated salon it was work that they hoped would spare them from the gas chambers this fashion workshop called the upper tailoring studio was established by hedwig höss the camp commandant's wife and patronized by the wives of ss guards and officers here the dressmakers produced high quality garments for ss social functions in auschwitz and for ladies from nazi berlin's upper crust drawing on diverse sources including interviews with the last surviving seamstress the dressmakers of auschwitz follows the fates of these brave women their bonds of family and friendship not only helped them endure persecution but also to play their part in camp resistance weaving the dressmakers remarkable experiences within the context of nazi policies for plunder and exploitation historian lucy adlington exposes the greed cruelty and hypocrisy of the third reich and offers a fresh look at a little known chapter of world war ii and the holocaust

a gripping sober and meticulous david margolick wall street journal biography of the infamous nazi doctor from a former justice department official tasked with uncovering his fate perhaps the most notorious war criminal of all time josef mengele was the embodiment of bloodless efficiency and passionate devotion to a grotesque worldview aided by the role he has assumed in works of popular culture mengele has come to symbolize the holocaust itself as well as the failure of justice that allowed countless nazi murderers and their accomplices to escape justice whether as the demonic doctor who directed mass killings or the elusive fugitive who escaped capture mengele has loomed so large that even with conclusive proof many refused to believe that he had died as chief of investigative research at the justice department's office of special investigations in the 1980s david g marwell worked on the mengele case interviewing his victims visiting the scenes of his crimes and ultimately holding his bones in his hands drawing on his own experience as well as new scholarship and sources marwell examines in scrupulous detail mengele's life and career he chronicles mengele's university studies which led to two phds and a promising career as a scientist his wartime service both in frontline combat and at auschwitz where his selections sent innumerable innocents to their deaths and his scientific pursuits including his studies of twins and eye color traumatized or killed countless more and his postwar flight from europe and refuge in south america mengele describes the international search for the nazi doctor in 1985 that ended in a cemetery in sao paulo brazil and the dogged forensic investigation that produced overwhelming evidence that mengele had died but failed to convince those who arguably most wanted him dead this is the riveting story of science without limits escape

without freedom and resolution without justice

otto dov kulka's memoir of a childhood spent in auschwitz is a literary feat of astounding emotional power exploring the permanent and indelible marks left by the holocaust winner of the jewish quarterly wingate prize 2014 as a child the distinguished historian otto dov kulka was sent first to the ghetto of theresienstadt and then to auschwitz as one of the few survivors he has spent much of his life studying nazism and the holocaust but always as a discipline requiring the greatest coldness and objectivity with his personal story set to one side but he has remained haunted by specific memories and images thoughts he has been unable to shake off translated by ralph mandel the greatest book on auschwitz since primo levi kulka has achieved the impossible the panel of judges jewish quarterly wingate prize

in february of 1945 350 american pows selected because they were jews thought to resemble jews or simply by malicious caprice were transported by cattle car to berga a concentration camp in eastern germany here the soldiers were worked to death starved and brutalized more than twenty percent died from this horrific treatment this is one of the last untold stories of world war ii and roger cohen re creates it in all its blistering detail ground down by the crumbling nazi war machine the men prayed for salvation from the allied troops yet even after their liberation their story was nearly forgotten there was no aggressive prosecution of the commandants of the camp and the pows received no particular recognition for their sacrifices cohen tells their story at last in a stirring tale of bravery and depredation that is essential for any reader of world war ii history

in a 1941 nazi roundup of educated poles stefan budziaszek newly graduated from medical school in krakow was incarcerated in the krakow montelupich prison and transferred to the auschwitz concentration camp in february 1942 german big businesses brutally exploited the cheap labor of prisoners in the camp and workers were dying in 1943 stefan now a functionary prisoner was put in charge of the on site prisoner hospital which at the time was more like an infirmary staffed by well connected but untrained prisoners stefan transformed this facility from just two barracks into a working hospital and outpatient facility that employed more than 40 prisoner doctors and served a population of 10 000 slave laborers kjk1 stefan and his staff developed the hospital by commandeering medication surgical equipment and even building materials often from the so called canada warehouse filled with the effects of holocaust victims but where does seeking the cooperation of the nazi concentration camp staff become collusion with nazi genocide how did physicians deal with debilitated patients who faced selection for transfer to the gas chambers auschwitz was a cauldron of competing agendas unexpectedly ideological rivalry among prisoners themselves manifested itself as well prominent holocaust witnesses elie wiesel and primo levi both sought treatment at this prisoner hospital they other patients and hospital staff bear witness to the agency of prisoner doctors in an environment better known for death than survival

gathers eyewitness accounts by former prisoners original camp documents orders of the commandant notes on medical experiments secret messages smuggled out by prisoners and brief profiles of the perpetrators

written in auschwitz itself and translated for the first time ever into english this one of a kind minute by minute true account is a crucial historical testament to a holocaust survivor s fight for his life at the largest extermination camp in nazi germany we know that there is only one ending to this only one liberation from this barbed wire hell death eddy de wind in 1943 amidst the start of german occupation eddy de wind worked as a doctor at westerbork a dutch transit camp his mother had been taken to this camp by nazis but eddy was assured by the jewish council she would be freed in exchange for his labor he later found out she d already

alfred wetzler was a true hero his escape from auschwitz and the report he helped compile telling for the first time the truth about the camp as a place of mass murder led directly to saving the lives of 120 000 jews the jews of budapest who were about to be deported to their deaths no other single act in the second world war saved so many jews from the fate that hitler and the ss had determined for them this book tells wetzler s story sir martin gilbert wetzler is a master at evoking the universe of auschwitz and especially his and vrba s harrowing flight to slovakia the day by day account of the tremendous difficulties the pair faced after the nazis had called off their search of the camp and its surroundings is both riveting and heart wrenching shining vibrantly through the pages of the memoir are the tenacity and valor of two young men who sought to inform the world about the greatest outrage ever committed by humans against their fellow humans from introduction by dr robert rozett together with another young slovak jew both of them deported in 1942 the author succeeded in escaping from the notorious death camp in the spring of 1944 there were some very few successful escapes from auschwitz during the war but it was these two who

smuggled out the damning evidence a ground plan of the camp constructional details of the gas chambers and crematoriums and most convincingly a label from a canister of cyclone gas the present book is cast in the form of a novel to allow factual information not personally collected by the two fugitives but provided for them by a handful of reliable friends to be included nothing however has been invented it is a shocking account of nazi genocide and of the inhuman conditions in the camp but equally shocking is the initial disbelief the fugitive s revelations met with after their return ewald osers has translated over 150 books and received many translation prizes and honours

a world war ii pictorial history detailing nazi germany s auschwitz concentration camp its monstrous creators and what went on inside the concentration camp at auschwitz birkenau was the site of the single largest mass murder in history over one million mainly jewish men women and children were murdered in its gas chambers countless more died as a result of disease and starvation auschwitz death camp is a chilling pictorial record of this infamous establishment using some 250 photographs together with detailed captions and accompanying text it describes how auschwitz evolved from a brutal labor camp at the beginning of the war into what was literally a factory of death the images show how people lived worked and died at auschwitz the book covers the men who conceived and constructed this killing machine and how the camp provided a vast labor pool for various industrial complexes erected in the vicinity auschwitz death camp is shocking proof of the magnitude of horror inflicted by the nazis on innocent men women and children such evil should not be forgotten lest it reappear

the sonderkommando of auschwitz birkenau consisted primarily of jewish prisoners forced by the germans to facilitate the mass extermination though never involved in the killing itself they were compelled to be members of staff of the nazi death factory this book translated for the first time into english from its original hebrew consists of interviews with the very few surviving men who witnessed at first hand the unparalleled horror of the auschwitz birkenau death camp some of these men had never spoken of their experiences before over a period of years gideon greif interviewed intensively all sonderkommando survivors living in israel they describe not only the details of the german nazi killing program but also the moral and human challenges they faced the book provides direct testimony about the final solution of the jewish problem but it is also a unique document on the boundless cruelty and deceit practiced by the germans it documents the helplessness and powerlessness of the one and a half million people 90 percent of them jews who were brutally murdered in the gas chambers of auschwitz birkenau

auschwitz birkenau is the site of the largest mass murder in human history yet its story is not
