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this book seeks to clarify postcolonial indigenous thought beginning at the new millennium it represents the voices of the first generation of global indigenous scholars and converges those voices their analyses and their dreams of a decolonized world marie battiste author the essays in reclaiming indigenous voice and vision spring from an international summer institute held in 1996 on the cultural restoration of oppressed indigenous peoples the contributors primarily indigenous unravel the processes of colonization that enfolded modern society and resulted in the oppression of indigenous peoples the authors among them gregory cajete erica irene daes bonnie duran and eduardo duran james youngblood henderson linda hogan leroy little bear ted moses linda tuhiwai te rina smith graham hingangaroa smith and robert yazzie draw on a range of disciplines professions and experiences addressing four urgent and necessary issues mapping colonialism diagnosing colonialism healing colonized indigenous peoples and imagining postcolonial visions they provide new frameworks for understanding how and why colonization has been so pervasive and tenacious among indigenous peoples they also envision what they would desire in a truly postcolonial context in moving and inspiring ways reclaiming indigenous voice and vision elaborates a new inclusive vision of a global and national order and articulates new approaches for protecting healing and restoring long oppressed peoples and for respecting their cultures and languages

this book shows that securing attorney first amendment rights protects the justice system by safeguarding client interests and checking government power

this handbook provides a comprehensive and cutting edge strengths based resource on the subject of indigenous resilience indigenous peoples demonstrate considerable resilience despite the social health economic and political disparities they experience within surrounding settler societies this book considers indigenous resilience in many forms cultural spiritual and governance traditions remain in some communities and are being revitalized in others to reclaim aspects of their cultures that have been outlawed suppressed or undermined it explores how indigenous people advocate for social justice and work to shape settler societies in ways that create a more just fair and equitable world for all human and non human beings this book is divided into five sections from the past to the future pillars of indigeneity the power in indigenous identities the natural world reframing the narrative from problem to opportunity comprised of 25 newly commissioned chapters from indigenous scholars professionals and community members from traditions around the world this book will be a useful tool for anyone seeking a deeper understanding of manifestations of wellness and resilience this handbook will be of particular interest to all scholars students and practitioners of social work social care and human services more broadly as well as those working in sociology development studies and environmental sustainability

voices from the ancestors brings together the reflective writings and spiritual practices of xicanx latinx and afro latinx womxn and male allies in the united states who seek to heal from the historical traumas of colonization by returning to ancestral traditions and knowledge this wisdom is based on the authors oral traditions research intuitions and lived experiences wisdom inspired by and created from personal trajectories on the path to spiritual conocimiento or inner spiritual inquiry this conocimiento has reemerged over the last fifty years as efforts to decolonize lives minds spirits and bodies have advanced yet this knowledge goes back many generations to the time when the ancestors understood their interconnectedness with each other with nature and with the sacred cosmic forces a time when the human body was a microcosm of the universe reclaiming and reconstructing spirituality based on non western epistemologies is central to the process of decolonization particularly in these fraught times the wisdom offered here appears in a variety of forms in reflective essays poetry prayers specific guidelines for healing practices communal rituals and visual art all meant to address life transitions and how to live holistically and with a spiritual consciousness for the challenges of the twenty first century

outsiders don't typically have access through incisive critique personal stories and intriguing exposé krucker razes the male gaze that packaged characters like carmen tosca and la traviata s violetta for viewer consumption and radically envisions an empowered new way of finding and fueling the authentic female voice through a series of breathing and vocal prompts that anyone not just singers can do krucker helps readers reconnect to their authentic primal voices she takes the reader inside her vocal studio to learn new methods of breath voicework and embodiment to uncover and access personal and social truths each chapter includes a theme related exercise an act of expression release self discovery or resistance that guides readers to develop voices unbound from anyone else's storytelling boldly and without apology

are you done with the mansplaining have you been interrupted one too many times don't stop talking take your voice back women's voices aren't being heard at work at home in public and in every facet of their lives when they speak up they're seen as pushy loud and too much when quiet they're dismissed as meek and mild everywhere they turn they're confronted by the assumptions of a male dominated world from the supreme court to the conference room to the classroom women are interrupted far more often than their male counterparts in the lab researchers found that female executives who speak more often than their peers are rated 14 percent less competent while male executives who do the same enjoy a 10 percent competency bump in outspoken veronica rueckert a peabody award winning former host at wisconsin public radio trained opera singer and communications coach teaches women to recognize the value of their voices and tap into their inherent power potential and capacity for self expression detailing how to communicate in meetings converse around the dinner table and dominate political debates outspoken provides readers with the tools guidance and encouragement they need to learn to love their voices and rise to the obligation to share them with the world outspoken is a substantive yet entertaining analysis of why women still haven't been fully granted the right to speak and a guide to how we can start changing the culture of silence positive instructive and supportive this welcome and much needed handbook will help reshape the world and make it better for women and for everyone it's time to stop shutting up and start speaking out

bringing armed conflicts to an end is difficult restoring a lasting peace can be considerably harder reclaiming everyday peace addresses the effectiveness and impact of local level interventions on communities affected by war using an innovative methodology to generate participatory numbers pamina firchow finds that communities saturated with external interventions after war do not have substantive higher levels of peacefulness according to community defined indicators of peace than those with lower levels of interventions these findings suggest that current international peacebuilding efforts are not very effective at achieving peace by local standards because disproportionate attention is paid to reconstruction governance and development assistance with little attention paid to community ties and healing firchow argues that a more bottom up approach to measuring the effectiveness of peacebuilding is required by finding ways to effectively communicate local community needs and priorities to the international community efforts to create an atmosphere for an enduring peace are possible

a bold new voice people a nuanced addition to the metoo conversation vice a young survivor tells her searing visceral story of sexual assault justice and healing in this gutwrenching memoir the numbers are staggering nearly one in five girls ages fourteen to seventeen have been the victim of a sexual assault or attempted sexual assault this is the true story of one of those girls in 2014 chessy prout was a freshman at st paul s school a prestigious boarding school in new hampshire when a senior boy sexually assaulted her as part of a ritualized game of conquest chessy bravely reported her assault to the police and testified against her attacker in court then in the face of unexpected backlash from her once trusted school community she shed her anonymity to help other survivors find their voice this memoir is more than an account of a horrific event it takes a magnifying glass to the institutions that turn a blind eye to such behavior and a society that blames victims rather than perpetrators chessy s story offers real powerful solutions to upend rape culture as we know it today prepare to be inspired by this remarkable young woman and her story of survival advocacy and hope in the face of unspeakable trauma

evocative authentic and brilliantly told a wonderful read david lammy foreword by west indies cricketer sir clive lloyd voices of the windrush generation is a powerful collection of stories from the men women and children of the windrush generation west indians who emigrated to britain between 1948 and 1971 in response to labour shortages and in search of a better life edited by journalist and bestselling author david matthews this book paints a vivid portrait of what it meant for those who left the caribbean for britain during the early days of mass migration through his own and many other stories matthews explores why and how so many people came to britain after world war ii their hopes and dreams the communities they formed and the difficulties they faced being separated from family and friends while integrating into an often hostile society we hear how lives were transformed and what became of the generations that followed taking the reader right up to the present day and the impact of the current windrush deportation scandal upon everyday people at once a nostalgic treasure trove of human interest which unearths the real stories behind the headlines and a celebration of black british culture voices of the windrush generation is an absorbing and important book that gives a platform to voices that need to be heard

indigenous students remain one of the least represented populations in higher education they continue to account for only one percent of the total post secondary student population and this lack of representation is felt in multiple ways beyond enrollment less research money is spent studying indigenous students and their interests are often left out of projects that otherwise purport to address diversity in higher education recently native scholars have started to reclaim research through the development of their own research methodologies and paradigms that are based in tribal knowledge systems and values and that allow inherent indigenous knowledge and lived experiences to strengthen the research reclaiming indigenous research in higher education highlights the

merle jordan argues that many people spend their adult lives struggling to distinguish between the imperatives of divine authority and the deeply rooted psychological authority of family structures employing the wisdom of his experience as a pastoral psychologist as well as the insights of clinical researchers and therapists jordan offers ways to demythologize false absolutes and to refocus distorted maps of reality

erika bachiochi offers an original look at the development of feminism in the united states advancing a vision of rights that rests upon our responsibilities to others in the rights of women erika bachiochi explores the development of feminist thought in the united states inspired by the writings of mary wollstonecraft bachiochi presents the intellectual history of a lost vision of women s rights seamlessly weaving philosophical insight biographical portraits and constitutional law to showcase the once predominant view that our rights properly rest upon our concrete responsibilities to god self family and community bachiochi proposes a philosophical and legal framework for rights that builds on the communitarian tradition of feminist thought as seen in the work of elizabeth fox genovese and jean bethke elshtain drawing on the insight of prominent figures such as sarah grimbé frances willard florence kelley betty friedan pauli murray ruth bader ginsburg and mary ann glendon this book is unique in its treatment of the moral roots of women s rights in america and its critique of the movement s current trajectory the rights of women provides a synthesis of ancient wisdom and modern political insight that locates the family s vital work at the very center of personal and political self government bachiochi demonstrates that when rights are properly understood as a civil and political apparatus born of the natural duties we owe to one another they make more visible our personal responsibilities and more viable our common life together this smart and sophisticated application of wollstonecraft s thought will serve as a guide for how we might better value the culturally essential work of the home and thereby promote authentic personal and political freedom the rights of women will interest students and scholars of political theory gender and women s studies constitutional law and all readers interested in women s rights

democracy is in shambles economically and politically the recent economic meltdown in europe and the u s has substituted democratic deliberation with technocratic decisions in athens madrid lisbon new york pittsburgh or istanbul protesters have denounced the incapacity and unwillingness of elected officials to heed to their voices while the diagnosis of our political economic illness has been established remedies are hard to come what can we do to restore our broken democracy which modes of political participation are likely to have an impact and what are the loci of political innovation in the wake of the crisis it is with these questions that reclaiming democracy engages we argue that the managerial approach to solving the crisis violates a right to politics that is a right that our collective life be guided by meaningful politics by discussion of and decision among genuinely alternative principles and policies the contributors to this volume are united in their commitment to explore how and where this right can be affirmed in a way that resuscitates democracy in the wake of the crisis

mixing theoretical reflection and empirical analysis the book offers fresh insights into democracy's current conundrum and makes concrete proposals about how the right to politics can be protected

a different voice a different song traces the history of a grassroots scene that has until now operated largely beneath the radar but that has been gently gathering force since the 1970s at the core of this scene today are the natural voice movement founded on the premise that everyone can sing and a growing transnational community of amateur singers participating in multicultural music activity author caroline bithell reveals the intriguing web of circumstances and motivations that link these two trends highlighting their potential with respect to current social political and educational agendas she investigates how and why songs from the world's oral traditions have provided the linchpin for the natural voice movement revealing how the musical traditions of other cultures not only provide a colourful repertoire but also inform the ideological methodological and ethical principles on which the movement itself is founded *a different voice a different song* draws on long term ethnographic research including participant observation at choir rehearsals performances workshops and camps as well as interviews with voice teachers choir and workshop leaders camp and festival organisers and general participants bithell shows how amateur singers who are not musically literate can become competent participants in a vibrant musical community and in the process find their voice metaphorically as well as literally she then follows some of these singers as they journey to distant locations to learn new songs in their natural habitat she theorises these trends in terms of the politics of participation the transformative potential of performance building social capital the global village and reclaiming the arts of celebration and conviviality the stories that emerge reveal a nuanced web of intersections between the local and global one which demands a revision of the dominant discourses of authenticity cultural appropriation and agency in the post colonial world and ultimately points towards a more progressive politics of difference *a different voice a different song* will be an essential text for practitioners involved in the natural voice movement and other vocal methodologies and choral worlds as a significant study in the fields of ethnomusicology music education and community music the book will also be of interest to scholars studying the democratisation of the voice the dynamics of participation world musics in performance the transformative power of harmony singing and the potential of music making for sustaining community and aiding intercultural understanding

approximately 2.4 million black youth participate in after school programs which offer a range of support including academic tutoring college preparation political identity development cultural and emotional support and even a space to develop strategies and tools for organizing and activism in reclaiming community bianca baldridge tells the story of one such community based program educational excellence ee shining a light on both the invaluable role youth workers play in these spaces and the precarious context in which such programs now exist drawing on rich ethnographic data baldridge persuasively argues that the story of ee is representative of a much larger and understudied phenomenon with the spread of neoliberal ideology and its reliance on racism marked

by individualism market competition and privatization these bastions of community support are losing the autonomy that has allowed them to embolden the minds of the youth they serve baldridge captures the stories of loss and resistance within this context of immense external political pressure arguing powerfully for the damage caused when the same structural violence that black youth experience in school starts to occur in the places they go to escape it

women s contribution to rhetoric throughout western history like so many other aspects of women s experience has yet to be fully explored in pathbreaking discussions ranging from ancient greece though the middle ages and the renaissance to modern times sixteen closely coordinated essays examine how women have used language to reflect their vision of themselves and their age how they have used traditional rhetoric and applied it to women s discourse and how women have contributed to rhetorical theory language specialists feminists and all those interested in rhetoric composition and communication will benefit from the fresh and stimulating cross disciplinary insights they offer
