interpersonal psychotherapy ipt an empirically validated treatment for depression and other disorders is becoming more frequently used to treat a range of psychiatric diagnoses based on evidence that interpersonal problems contribute to the onset of psychiatric disorders ipt helps patients to change interpersonal behavior in order to improve psychosocial functioning and relieve symptoms ipt both relieves psychiatric symptoms and helps to build social skills bringing together experts who have treated patients with and conducted clinical research on ipt the casebook of interpersonal psychotherapy responds to the growing need for a foundational text to supplement the available manuals on ipt the casebook provides a wealth of real life treatment material and illustrates the use of ipt in the hands of expert psychotherapists treating patients with a range of conditions and complications in different ipt treatment formats the detailed cases give a sense of how ipt proceeds and how it works chapter authors describe specific adaptations of ipt for patients with particular disorders including mood disorders anxiety disorders eating disorders and personality disorders the book also covers different contexts in which ipt may be practiced including group therapy inpatient settings and telephone therapy the casebook of interpersonal psychotherapy is an invaluable resource for psychiatrists psychologists social workers psychiatric nurses and other mental health professionals interested in psychotherapy

following the publication of the handbook of the brief psychotherapies wells giannetti 1990 the editors began to conceptualize the idea of a collection of case studies encompassing a number of the commonly encountered clinical problems that have been treated with such approaches the casebook of the brief psychotherapies is the result the case book details clinical interventions with client populations as diverse as substance abusers torture victims the physically handicapped and other exceptional groups and the economically disadvantaged with emotional and behavioral problems as well as individuals experiencing sexual dysfunction or eating disorders in addition topics such as bereavement depression anger and many crucial aspects of marital and family therapy are discussed by eminent clinical practitioners although the cases draw heavily upon cognitive behavioral and strategic structural formulations psychodynamic interpersonal and experiential approaches are also included the casebook is clinically oriented with a minimum of theory ample case material and commentary allow the reader to experience directly the application of brief therapy to specific client problems what emerges from this compendium of approaches and problems is a treasury of action oriented problem solving skill building rational approaches to therapy that balance the client's ability to change with the demands and limits of time

this book presents for the first time a practical manual for psychodynamic interpersonal therapy drawing on forty years of research teaching and practice its expert authors guide you through the conversational model's theory skills and implications for practice part i sets out the model's underlying theory and outlines the evidence for its efficacy with client groups part ii guides you through clinical skills of the model from foundational to advanced part iii offers practical guidance on implementing the approach within a range of settings and for developing effective practice through reflection and supervision

interpersonal psychotherapy ipt is a brief treatment approach that has demonstrated effectiveness for treatment of major depressive disorders in adults ipt takes the position that although there are many causes for depression understanding the current social and interpersonal circumstances of the client associated with the onset of a recent episode of depression will expedite understanding current symptoms and help the client move toward developing new ways of coping the books in this program clearly define the focus of treatment as here and now

short term dynamic interpersonal psychotherapy is an integrated trauma informed contemporary dynamic way of working with a range of mental health difficulties flexible though structured phase oriented focused and time limited it is informed by the conversational model attachment and interpersonal theories and brief psychodynamic psychotherapies which are briefly described it provides clinicians with a way of working with patients whose difficulties do not warrant long term therapy who prefer a talking therapy or who have failed cognitive behaviour therapies

with the help of examples it guides the process of assessment and therapy with trauma in mind using conversational model techniques where empathy replaces confrontation resistance is seen as a fear of re traumatization defence mechanisms are regarded as adaptive coping mechanisms which later become maladaptive transference interventions replace interpretations and self reflective capacity is encouraged rather than just insight separation anxiety is addressed and anxiety provoking techniques are avoided given that anxiety is a large part of most presentations

the book compiles the results of several research studies on this subject it discusses important developments in interpersonal psychotherapy research and its translation into clinical practice it describes typical phases of treatments and highlights applications for patient populations which have seen results from interpersonal psychotherapy

patients with personality disorders need targeted treatments which are able to deal with the specific aspects of the core pathology and to tackle the challenges they present to the treatment clinicians such patients however are often difficult to engage are prone to ruptures in the therapeutic alliance and have difficulty adhering to a manualized treatment giancarlo dimaggio antonella montano raffaele popolo and giampaolo salvatore aim to change this and have developed a practical and systematic manual for the clinician using metacognitive interpersonal therapy mit and including detailed procedures for dealing with a range of personality disorders the book is divided into two parts pathology and treatment and provides precise instructions on how to move from the basic steps of forming an alliance drafting a therapy contract and promoting self reflections to the more advanced steps of promoting change and helping the patient move toward health and adaptation with clinical examples summaries of therapies and excerpts of session transcripts metacognitive interpersonal therapy for personality disorders will be welcomed by psychotherapists clinical psychologists and other mental health professionals involved in the treatment of personality disorders

as i begin to write this preface i feel a rush of excitement i have now finished the book my gestalt is coming into completion throughout the months that i have been writing this i have indeed been intrinsically motivated now that it is finished i feel quite competent and self determining see chapter 2 whether or not those who read the book will perceive me that way is also a concern of mine an extrinsic one but it is a wholly separate issue from the intrinsic rewards i have been experiencing this book presents a theoretical perspective it reviews an enormous amount of research which establishes unequivocally that intrinsic motivation exists also considered herein are various approaches to the conceptualizing of intrinsic motivation the book concentrates on the approach which has developed out of the work of robert white 1959 namely that intrinsically motivated behaviors are ones which a person engages in so that he may feel competent and self determining in relation to his environment the book then considers the development of intrinsic motivation how behaviors are motivated intrinsically how they relate to

and how intrinsic motivation is extrinsically motivated behaviors affected by extrinsic rewards and controls it also considers how changes in intrinsic motivation relate to changes in attitudes how people attribute motivation to each other how the attribution process is motivated and how the process of perceiving motivation and other internal states in oneself relates to perceiving them in others
